

## Jennifer Brody, MD

Jennifer Brody, MD, MPH, AAHIVS provides HIV primary care and addictions care at Boston Healthcare for the Homeless Program (BHCHP). She is also the Director of BHCHP's HIV Program which provides comprehensive health care and outreach services to approximately 330 of Boston's most vulnerable homeless people living with HIV. In this role, she oversees program planning, implementation, evaluation, and quality improvement activities at BHCHP with the goal to eliminate inequities in HIV outcomes for this vulnerable population.

Dr. Brody is an Instructor of Medicine at the Harvard Medical School and co-leads a Social Justice Curriculum for the Division of General Medicine Primary Care Residency Program at the Brigham and Women's Hospital. She teaches medical residents, public health students, and physician colleagues in a variety of forums about the special health care delivery needs of people experiencing homelessness using a racial justice framework.

Dr. Brody earned her Medical Degree and Master of Public Health Degree from the University of California, Los Angeles, and completed her primary care internal medicine residency at the Brigham and Women's Hospital. She is a certified HIV Specialist through the American Academy of HIV Medicine, and Board Certified in Internal Medicine and Addiction Medicine.



## H. Dawn Fukuda, ScM

Director, Office of HIV/AIDS, Bureau of Infectious Disease and Laboratory Sciences  
Massachusetts Department of Public Health

Dawn Fukuda is the Director of the Office of HIV/AIDS (OHA) in the Massachusetts Department of public Health. She has served as the HIV/AIDS Director for 11 years and has worked at the state health department for 17 years. Her prior professional experience in the community includes roles as a program director, medical case manager, health educator, and HIV treatment advocate. She has served as both Vice Chair and Chair of NASTAD and currently serves on the Board of Directors, and served for six years as an appointed member of the CDC and HRSA Advisory Committee for HIV, STDs, and Viral Hepatitis (or the CHAC).



## Jonathan Hanft

Jonathan grew up in the Washington, D.C. area. He graduated from Cornell University with a degree in Plant Sciences and received a M.S. and PhD in Agronomy from the University of Minnesota.

Jonathan was raised in a family steeped in movement politics and social justice work. His grandmother emigrated from Romania to escape the pogroms and was one of the first members of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union. His father volunteered in the Israeli Army during their war for independence in 1948, and his mother worked in President Lyndon Johnson's Office of Economic Opportunity, creating some of the nation's first community health centers. She eventually became a Deputy Assistant Secretary in the Department of Health and Human Services in the Carter administration.



Experiencing the devastating impact of AIDS on friends and the gay community, he became involved in HIV prevention and care in 1987. He has been an HIV health educator, case manager for HIV positive youth, HIV insurance specialist, and a program and funding administrator.

As manager of Hennepin County Human Services and Public Health Department's Ryan White Program since 2002, Jonathan leads the Minneapolis-St. Paul Part A Transitional Grant Area's administrative team. He also serves as a board member of the CAEAR Coalition, on NACCHO's HIV/STI/Viral Hepatitis Workgroup, and co-facilitates the CAEAR Coalition/NACCHO Ryan White Part A and Ending the HIV Epidemic community of practice.

Jonathan resides in Minneapolis and has lived in the Twin Cities Metro Area for 40 years. Upon moving to Minnesota, he fell in love with the prairie. He frequently hikes in the State's Scientific and Natural Areas, and the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum is one of his favorite spots. To unwind, he tends his perennial gardens and watches birds.

## Rita Harcrow

Rita Harcrow is the Director of HUD's Office of HIV/AIDS Housing. This office oversees the Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) Program, which is the only federal program dedicated to the housing needs of low-income people living with HIV/AIDS.

Prior to joining HUD as the Director of the Office in 2015, Rita worked for more than 20 years in the nonprofit sector in rural Alabama developing and operating housing and supportive services programs for special needs populations including people living with HIV/AIDS.



## LCDR R. Paul McClung, MD

LCDR R. Paul McClung, MD currently leads the HIV Outbreak Coordination Unit in the Division of HIV Prevention at CDC. Since 2018, his work has focused on providing technical assistance to state and local health departments responding to HIV clusters and outbreaks, including numerous HIV outbreaks affecting people who inject drugs and people experiencing homelessness.

Prior to his work in HIV cluster detection and response, Dr. McClung completed the Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) Fellowship program at CDC in the Division of Foodborne, Waterborne, and Environmental Diseases with a focus on waterborne disease surveillance and outbreak response. He was commissioned as an officer in the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps in 2016.

Dr. McClung holds a B.A. in Theology from Lipscomb University and received his M.D. from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. He completed Internal Medicine training with a distinction in HIV Medicine in the J. Willis Hurst Internal Medicine Residency Program at Emory University School of Medicine, where he also served as a Chief Resident. He maintains board certification in Internal Medicine.



## Dr. Susan Robilotto

Dr. Susan Robilotto is a board certified family practice physician credentialed as an HIV specialist by the American Academy of HIV Medicine who has provided HIV primary care at a local health department as well as jails and state prisons. Susan serves as the Director of the Division of State HIV/AIDS Programs at the HIV/AIDS Bureau at HRSA, which oversees the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Part B, which provides care and treatment for vulnerable people with HIV. Prior to becoming director, she served as the clinical advisor for the Division of Metropolitan and the Division of State HIV/AIDS Programs at the HIV/AIDS Bureau (HAB) for 6 years.
