Uniquely, residing on the Gulf Coast that are increasingly impacted by frequent hurricanes, Dr Brennan has developed vast experience in engaging displaced populaces, another classification of “hard to reach” population. These skill was well utilized during the SAR COV-2 PHE, as DR. Brennan assured the success of various community based organizations recruit and serve PWH and those at risk. Dr. Brennan interventions focus equally on the health care system, motivating practice transformation to overcome the clinical inertia that can inhibit the care of those most in need.



She practices as a Nurse Practitioner focusing on Sexual and Gender Minorities (SGM) health including Persons with HIV (PWH) and those at risk for HIV and other STI. Based on her practice and research, she has numerous peer reviewed publications and has presented at various regional and national professional meetings. Dr. Brennan has sat on regional and national policy developing boards and has been funded by NCI, DOD, HRSA as well as various foundations and governmental sources.
